General Context:

The existing Constitution and Bylaws are combined into a document that needs to be condensed and divided into two different documents: a Constitution (which addresses the mission of the church and is much harder to change) and the Bylaws (which is the document that guides how we do the work, and has a lower barrier for adjustments to be made). This chart is an attempt to show how the committee has worked to extract sections of the existing documents and put them in the appropriate new document. The comparisons are not exact due to the attempt to streamline and reorganize, but every effort has been made to match them up as closely as possible.

The committee has recommend reviewing the changes in phases. The first phase of the process will be the Constitution and the bylaws that directly affect the immediate changes to the Constitution (e.g. creation of the role of elders). The next phase will evaluate the remaining bylaws, with ongoing communication with the congregation and then a vote. The existing bylaws remain in effect until that time.

CHURCH COVENANT

Section 102	The governance of this church shall be by its membership in accordance with the provisions of its Constitution, By-Laws and Amendments.	Constitution Article VI - Polity This church shall be Elder led, Deacon served, and congregationally affirmed. The congregationally affirmed Elders have biblically granted authority, responsibility, and accountability. The congregation, as the temple of the Holy Spirit, affirms the leadership of the Elders. There are decisions in which the congregants contribute in helping the Elders discern the mind of Christ. That means that the Elders have authority and responsibility in all areas of church government except those items specifically reserved by the Congregation in the Bylaws.	This clarifies the organizational structure of the church. Article 200 - Membership

Section 201

The membership of this church shall consist of those persons who have confessed Jesus Christ to be their Savior and Lord, and who;

- 201.1 Have been examined regarding their Christian experience;
- 201.2 Have had their letters of transfer and recommendation or substitutes therefor examined;
- 201.3 Have been accepted by at least two-thirds (2/3) vote of the church members present;
- **201.4** Have received believer's baptism by immersion;
- **201.5** Have been accepted by statement or restoration:
- 201.6 Have entered into Church Covenant as printed in these By-Laws.

Section 202

Explanation:

By Letter, is meant a letter of transfer from another church of like faith and order.

By Statement, is meant reception of one who received believer's baptism by immersion or has been a member of a church of like faith and order but has lost that membership.

Constitution Article V – Membership

The membership of this church shall consist of persons who confess faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as personal Savior, who give evidence of regeneration by living consistently with their profession and with the views of faith, doctrine and practice of this church, who have been baptized by immersion and who have been received into its membership according to the bylaws of this church.

BYLAWS: ARTICLE 1 – MEMBERSHIP

Membership shall consist of all persons who have met the requirements for membership, as provided in Article V of our Constitution.

Section 1: Application for Membership

- a. Anyone desiring membership with West Lynchburg Baptist Church shall complete the membership application and meet with the Senior Pastor or another Elder to give their personal testimony, commitment to this church, and make a public profession in Jesus Christ.
- b. Applicants shall agree to and support the mission, statement of faith, and membership covenant of West Lynchburg Baptist Church.
- c. New members shall be presented by an Elder and affirmed by congregation at any scheduled meeting of the church.

Section 2: Categories of Membership

Membership shall be classified into two categories.

Membership in the congregation is reserved for believers. Further, it is vital that membership mean something and that there is a tangible commitment to the mission and purpose of the church.

The two membership categories allow for a discipleship process to occur in our young people before they vote on matters regarding church governance.

Section 203

Termination of Membership:

- **203.1** By death;
- 203.2 By letter of transfer when requested by a church of like faith and order by vote of the church;
- 203.3 By vote of the church when a member has joined a church of different faith and order;
- **203.4** By written request of the member.

- a. Covenant Members. This category shall consist of all members ages 16 and above who are active and fulfill the requirements of the covenant and have privileges of voting as Covenant Members.
- **b. Non-Covenant Members.** Members who are baptized children under the age of 16.

Section 3: Duties and Privileges of Membership

- a. In accord with the duties enumerated in the Covenant, each member shall be privileged and expected to participate in and contribute to the ministry and life of the church, consistent with God's leading and with the gifts, time, and material resources each has received from God.
- b. It is the privilege and responsibility of members to attend all members' meetings to vote on the election of officers and other matters as may be submitted to a vote.
- c. Every covenant member of the church is entitled to one vote on all matters requiring congregational approval, provided the member is present. Voting rights of the members shall not be assignable by proxy, written or otherwise.

Section 4: Termination of Membership

Termination of membership may occur for, but not limited to, the following reasons:

a. Death of the member.

		 b. Transfer to another Baptist church by the member. c. Affiliation with a church of another denomination by the member. d. By request of member desiring termination. e. As a result of disciplinary action by a congregational vote. f. Inability to be contacted due to an invalid address and phone number, and no contact information being found after one year of due diligence. g. Inactivity that is not due to physical limitations for two (2) years or more, after multiple contacts by church leadership have been made. No letter of recommendation shall be issued for a person whose membership has been terminated.

members resigns, or is unable to serve on the Pastor Search Committee; other members of the committee may recommend an additional member to be elected by the church. The committee shall elect its own chairman, secretary or any other officers desired.

501.1 The purpose of this committee shall be to bring to the church a recommendation for an Interim Pastor as needed and subsequently a nomination for a person to serve as Pastor. Pastoral election shall take place at a business meeting called for that specific purpose. When this committee wishes to make a nomination to the church it shall give at least one (1) week written to congregation. It shall bring only one (1) nominee at a time and the election shall be by private ballot. A twothirds (2/3) vote of those members present and voting shall be necessary to elect.

- 1. The Senior Pastor shall be chosen by the church for an indefinite period of time.
- 2. The Senior Pastor shall serve as an Elder.
- 3. When the Senior Pastor position is vacant
 - a. The Elders will fill the pulpit or select pulpit supply or an Interim Pastor.
 - b. A Pastor Search Committee will be selected composed of the following: Three (3) Lay Elders, Personnel Committee Chair, and five (5) additional members recommend by the Elders to be elected by the church. If any of the nine (9) members resigns; committee members may recommend an additional member to be elected by the church. The committee shall elect its own chairman, secretary, or any other officers as desired.
 - c. The purpose of this committee shall be to bring to the church a recommendation for a Senior Pastor.
- 4. Senior Pastor election shall take place at a business meeting called for that specific purpose. There must be at least two (2) weeks written notice to the congregation. Only one (1) candidate at a time may be presented

Any two members with reason to believe that an Elder should be dismissed should express such concern to the Elders and, if need be, to the congregation. Any such action shall be done in accordance with the instructions of our Lord in Matthew 18:15–17 and 1 Timothy 5:17–21. Any of the Elders may be dismissed at any business meeting of the church. In order to be dismissed, a quorum must be present, and the dismissal must be passed by a two-thirds (2/3) vote.
- h. The Council of Elders has final say in any and all matters concerning the overall spiritual direction of the organization. The following are decisions, in addition to those already stated, that the Council of Elders may not make without membership approval at an organizational business meeting.
 - 1. The Council of Elders may not appoint a new Senior Pastor.
 - 2. The Council of Elders may not authorize the annual operating budget without congregational approval at a business meeting.
 - 3. The Council of Elders, with the Stewardship Committee and

	Properties Committeemay not approve emergency expenditures for the organization in excess of five percent (5%) of the current year's annual operating budget. 4. The Council of Elders cannot change the denominational affiliation of West Lynchburg Baptist Church without congregational approval at the business meeting. 5. The Council of Elders may not change the Articles of Incorporation, Constitution, or Bylaws of West Lynchburg Baptist Church without congregational approval at a business meeting.
